**TOWN WARRANT**  
**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Bradford, in the County of  
Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bradford on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
3. To choose delegates to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see if the town will vote to place an electric light on the street leading to the house of P. G. Wells.
5. To see if the town will vote to place an electric light on the street near the house of H. O. Russell.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the extermination of white pine blister rust.
7. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee of three or more members to investigate the water conditions and facilities of the town with the view to providing for an adequate supply of water for domestic, fire, and other public purposes, said committee to have the authority to employ engineering and other assistance and to secure propositions for the sale of properties and rights to the town for such

purposes, and to make report with recommendations at an adjourned meeting; to see if the town will raise or appropriate money for the necessary expense of such committee.

8. To see what action the town will take for the construction of sidewalks and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to sell the school house in district No. 7 near the residence of Fred H. Stevens.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to renting school houses not used for school purposes.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to place chemical toilets in town hall in conjunction with the school rooms, as per orders of board of health.

12. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of a snow plow, and raise or appropriate for the same.

13. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairs on the covered bridge on Henniker road, and raise or appropriate for same.

14. To see if the town will authorize its Treasurer to borrow money, under the direction of the Selectmen, to meet the wants of the town.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

1. The number of half day-sessions was 11 less than last year. Two weeks of school were lost by both village schools, and only one day less by the Center School. This represents \$167.20 paid in teachers' salaries with no return.

The state average for number of half-days in session for 1927-28 was 351.7.

2. There has been an increase in the total number of pupils registered, and an increase in average membership of 8.7. This average has steadily increased during the past three years.
3. The lower per cent of attendance is due to mumps and whooping cough.
4. The amount of tardiness is much greater. Every effort should be made to curb this, as it is much higher than is reasonable.

As will be noted the number of pupils enrolled in the public schools of the district was 85. The number of pupils residing in the district but attending public schools outside was as follows: Washington elementary, 5; Hillsborough High, 1; Warner High, 8. This makes the total number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools 99. The per capita tax for December, 1930, will therefore be \$198.

The annual medical inspection made by Dr. R. F. Oliver was reported as follows:

Number cases defective vision 8, hearing 1, teeth 34, breathing 1, diseased tonsils 12.

At the close of the school year in June six pupils were graduated from Grade VIII as follows:

*Center School*—Alberta Stebbins, Richard Stevens.

*Grammar School*—Robert Gage, Kathleen Hall, Doris Kimball, Laurence Long.

In November and December standard tests in Reading, Arithmetic, Computation, Arithmetic Reasoning, Spelling, Language Usage were given Grades 3-8 inclusive, also intelligence tests. In grades 6-8 inclusive standard tests in Geography, Grammar and U. S. History were also given. In every class a diagnosis was made and work prescribed to remedy any general weakness of the class and also the particular defects in scholarship of individual pupils. In May re-tests were given in Arithmetic and Grammar. Especial improvement was noted in the latter subject.

The installation of a chemical toilet at the Center School has, we believe, been found a distinct improvement. The interior of the schoolroom at the Center is in need of repairs. As suggested in a previous report, some kind of wallboard would be used to best advantage here. The cross-lighting of the room should also be removed.

Globes of the suspension type at least twelve inches in diameter are needed in this school and in the Grammar School. For the village schools chemical toilets of the same type as that at the Center are needed, and we would recommend that their installation be considered for the coming year.

We wish to thank the Board for their co-operation and support during the year.

## REPORT OF BRADFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT

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The past year has been very successful for the department in checking minor as well as serious fires. The Active and Honorary members combined now total sixty-one men. Of this number, fifteen have been admitted into the department in the past year.

We wish to thank the town and selectmen for their co-operation; also for the badges and efficient nozzle.

We have answered 18 calls the past year of which 7 were chimney fires; five were building or roof fires, 5 were forest and grass fires and 1 in the motion picture booth in the town hall. Three of the 18 fires were out of town: the Clogston place in Warner, the Ferry house and Cummings house at So. Sutton, and the forest fire over at Sunapee mountain.

During the past year the department has raised money of which some has gone for the purchase of the following articles: 4 rubber coats, 4 rubber hats, 4 Iron shovels, 12 pair balloon silk mittens, desk, 2 pair goggles and 2 pair rubber boots.

The success of our company is largely due to the interest and hard work given free by its members. We have often been asked the correct way to advise the company of a fire. It is thus: Call the telephone operator, take two minutes, if necessary, to tell them about the fire. Do not tell them to blow the siren. Tell them the real facts of the fire and they have instructions what to do. If your house is actually on fire you may be sure they will blow the siren at once. Simply tell them facts. The company is working hard to protect your property; please help us by following the above instructions.

1. Only one-half day was lost in the district. Last year 58 were lost.
2. The per cent of attendance is very high, considerably above the state average of 95.5, and the highest in Union No. 61.
3. The number of tardinesses is only 45 per cent of the number last year, less than half as many. This is very gratifying.
4. These statistics indicate that this is one of the best years the district has had.

The number of pupils enrolled in the public schools of the district was 80. The number of pupils residing in the district, and attending public schools outside the district was 11, distributed as follows: Concord high, 1; Hillsboro high, 1; Warner high, 9. The number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools was therefore 91.

The above roll of honor is an excellent record. Parents, pupils, and school board may well be proud of it.

### **Medical Inspection**

The annual medical inspection was made by Dr. R. F. Oliver, and reported as follows:

Number of pupils examined, 65; teachers, 3; number of pupils 10 per cent or more underweight, 21; number of cases of defective vision, 4; defective hearing, 2; anaemia, 1; nervous condition, 1; defective teeth, 23; diseased tonsils, 16; adenoids, 2; measles, 2; skin diseases, 5; number vaccinated, 63; unvaccinated, 2.

At the graduation exercises of the eighth grade in June ten pupils received diplomas. At the Center school one was graduated from this grade.

Further improvement of the building at the Center is needed in order to remove the large amount of cross light-



ing there. By covering the side of the room on the right-hand side of the pupils with blackboard both the needed blackboard would be secured and the cross lighting eliminated.

At the Grammar school considerable improvement could be made by putting up a partition along the length of the room parallel to the present blackboard. The blackboards could then be placed along this partition, thus bringing them within range of the light from the windows, and preventing serious eye strain for the pupils. The small movable board now used would then be unnecessary, thus doing away with the confusion caused by moving it about the room. At the same time space would be provided for a warm cloak room for both the Grammar and Primary rooms between the new partition and the present wall between the rooms. It would then be no longer necessary for the school rooms to be partly filled by the wraps of the pupils. The cloak room could be lighted by overhead windows from each side.

New curtains or shades are needed in the grammar room. If these are replaced we recommend that the Duo-roll white canvas type be purchased. These may cost more in the beginning, but in the end are more satisfactory and economical. They are guaranteed for fifteen years, and can be washed as often as necessary. The white color permits much more light to come through when the shades are drawn to shut out direct sunlight. Dark or opaque shades shut out the light that is so much needed in this room.

During the year the teachers worked loyally to forward the interests of the schools and individual pupils. We have found our work with them and with the Board very satisfactory.

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**The regular hours of school** are 8:45—12:00 a. m. and 1:00—3:45 p. m.

**In all schools the teacher** is to remain at the school during the noon intermission. Organized play and games for the pupils are essential. Pupils may plan these with the aid of the teacher.

**Teachers are to be in their** respective rooms, or on the playground to look after their pupils not less than 20 minutes before school opens. Much trouble will thus be avoided.

**Pupils in grades I and II** may be dismissed 30 minutes earlier than the pupils of the higher grades in the forenoon and in the afternoon. Care should be taken to see that they do not get into mischief during this time.

The sixteen pupils who attended school for the entire year without missing a single half-session or being tardy, and also their parents, deserve much credit. It indicates the formation of habits of punctuality and responsibility on the part of the pupils, also good health. These are much more important than some things learned from books. On the part of the parents it shows interest, loyal cooperation, and various sacrifices. We wish to thank especially all the parents and pupils who have a part in making the above very creditable record.

The annual medical inspection made by Dr. R. F. Oliver was reported as follows:

Number of pupils examined, 72; number teachers, 3; number 10% or more underweight, 12; defective vision, 3; defective hearing, 2; cardiac disease, 1; defective teeth, 28; diseased tonsils, 13; enlarged glands, 1; chicken pox, 2; total vaccinated, 72.

We believe that a dental clinic for the pupils of the district would be found very beneficial. Such clinics have been held in three of the towns of the supervisory union during the past year with much satisfaction to both parents and pupils. Only experienced and well recommended dentists are employed. The rates charged are about half the usual rates at a dentist's office. For the benefit of those who are unable to pay for this work funds are usually provided by some local organization such as the Red Cross.

A class of eight pupils was graduated from the eighth grade at the close of school in June. Nearly all these graduates have continued their school work in high school.

We continue our recommendations for the improvement of the schoolrooms of the district as outlined in our report for last year. This could be done with comparatively small outlay. What is really needed for the village schools is a new building in which there might be adequate lighting and ventilation, and where there might be a larger playground off the main highway.

The work of the year has been successful, and we thank the board for their support and cooperation.

If any school is in session on any of these days, it may close that number of days earlier than scheduled in June. If other days are lost they must be made up. The day for Hopkinton Fair is allowed on condition that at least 50 per cent of the pupils of a school attend the fair on that day.

**Teachers' salaries** will be paid in ten equal installments: one during the week following the first Saturday of the month.

**The regular hours** of school are 8:45—12:00 a. m. and 1:00—3:45 p. m.

**Pupils in grades I and II** may be dismissed 30 minutes earlier than the pupils of the higher grades in the forenoon and in the afternoon. Care must be taken to see that they do not get into mischief during this time.

**In all schools** teachers are to remain at the school during the noon intermission. Organized plays and games should be planned for the pupils with the cooperation of the pupils.

**Teachers are to be in their respective rooms**, or on the playgrounds to look after their pupils not less than 20 minutes before school time in the morning. Much trouble will thus be avoided.

The annual medical inspection by Dr. R. F. Oliver was reported as follows:

Number pupils examined, 74; underweight, 15; defective vision, 11; defective hearing, 4; anaemia, 3; defective teeth, 18; diseased tonsils, 11; adenoids, 1; impetigo, several; no. vaccinated, 72; unvaccinated, 2.

We note that there has been an increase of 10.7% in number of cases of defective vision since last year. This is a serious matter and should receive immediate attention from the parents of the pupils affected. The number of cases of defective teeth has decreased 14.5% since last year. This is an excellent record, and we hope that it may be continued through next year. The work done at the regular rates at the dentist's office could be done at a local dental clinic for about half the usual cost, and more pupils benefitted. We recommend this plan to parents who expect to have more dental work done this year.

Seven pupils completed the work of the eighth grade in June. Of these all but two have entered high school.

In conclusion we wish to thank the parents of the pupils, also the school board members for their support and cooperation during the year.

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bradford, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bradford on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same. (The raising of money and other articles in the warrant will be taken up at 1 o'clock P. M.)
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for new construction, and if so to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,063.50 for same. In accordance with provisions of Chapter 59, New Hampshire Laws of 1933, amending Section 24, of Chapter 84, of the Public Laws of New Hampshire. If State Aid Construction is applied for as above, such joint funds must be expended on: Center Road.
4. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of the old snow rollers, also the roller shed at the Center, or raise and appropriate money for the repair of said shed.



5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for currant bills, in anticipation of taxes.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and other Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

If any school is in session on any of these days, it may close that number of days earlier than scheduled in June. If other days are lost they must be made up. The day for Hopkinton Fair is allowed on condition that at least 50 per cent of the pupils of a school attend the fair on that day.

**Teachers' salaries** will be paid in ten equal installments: one during the week following the first Saturday of the month.

**The regular hours** of school are 8:45—12:00 a. m. and 1:00—3:45 p. m.

**Pupils in grades I and II** may be dismissed 30 minutes earlier than the pupils of the higher grades in the forenoon and in the afternoon. Care must be taken to see that they do not get into mischief during this time.

**In all schools** teachers are to remain at the school during the noon intermission. Organized plays and games should be planned for the pupils with the cooperation of the pupils.

**Teachers are to be in their respective rooms,** or on the playgrounds to look after their pupils not less than 20 minutes before the school time in the morning. Much trouble will thus be avoided.

## **REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

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To the Citizens of Bradford:

This is my first report as your superintendent. It deals with the following topics:

- (1) Our reorganized supervisory union.
- (2) Statistics of our schools.
- (3) Health of school children.
- (4) Age of entrance to first grade.

### **Our Reorganized Supervisory Union**

In accordance with an economy measure enacted into law at the last session of the General Court, the school districts of the State have been rearranged, for purposes of school supervision, into larger unions, in order to dispense with the services of five superintendents.

The Warner Union, No. 61, of which Bradford was a part, was one of the smaller unions in the State, and was dissolved last July by action of the State Board of Education. Bradford is included in the Hopkinton union, No. 26, which now comprises six districts—Hopkinton, Henniker, Bradford, Dunbarton, Newbury and Sutton.

The foregoing table shows that Bradford's record of attendance last year was somewhat below the State average. The principal reason for this was the epidemic of whooping cough last spring.

Our record of tardiness shows almost twice as many as the average of the State, in spite of the fact that the Center school has very few tardinesses.

Enrollment for the present year in the primary room at the village is much larger than usual, and it has been necessary to provide some assistance for Miss Cilley. Mr. Philip Dodge has been employed to serve as assistant at this school.

## **Health of School Children**

Health is one of the most important factors conditioning the success of pupils in school work. Our school physician makes an annual examination of the health of school children and reports needed corrections of eyes, teeth, etc., to the parents. Dr. Oliver is to be commended for securing a fair percentage of corrections through his efforts. For a short time this winter, a school nurse, Miss Rachel Wilson, has been working here, paid by the Civil Works Administration. She has been of some assistance in cases that the physician has not found time to follow up. She also gave an audiometer test in all the schools. This is an accurate method of determining how well a child can hear. A few defective ears were found, and steps are being taken to correct these wherever possible.

It is hoped that before the close of the year we may have the benefit of a dental clinic in Bradford. Dr. Oliver has generously offered the use of his office and dental chair for this purpose.

## **Age of Entrance to First Grade**

Each year, parents request the privilege of sending to school some children who are too young to do well the work of the first grade. These parents made the mistake of thinking that if the child gets an early start, his chances of progress through the school course will be improved. The opposite is likely to be the case; for the child usually finds new tasks coming to him from year to year that are just a little too hard for one of his age to grasp, while the more mature members of his grade can learn them easily. The result is frequently a failure to be promoted at some point in the course, with resulting discouragement; or more often a case of being just a little behind the others all the way along, and

barely making the grade. If no pupil entered school until after he had passed his sixth birthday, the chances of success by all would be improved; in fact, a child would seldom if ever lose by it, if he should wait until he were seven years old before entering.

### **Conclusion**

The short time that I have been working in Bradford has been very enjoyable. Our schools owe much to the leadership and effective work of my predecessor, Mr. Sinclair. The earnest efforts of the teachers, and the willing co-operation of parents and citizens, deserve gratitude. Let us continue to work together for the good of the children.

## TOWN WARRANT

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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bradford, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bradford, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The raising of money and other articles in the warrant will be taken up at one o'clock p. m.
- 3A. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,047.00 for the construction of the Center Road, provided the State shall appropriate the sum of \$2,094.00 for the same purpose, it being understood that if said appropriation is made by the State and the town accepts said special aid, that the town shall not be entitled to State Aid for Class II roads.

3B. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II road known as Center Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1,047.00; or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$676.26.

4. To see if the town would care to take over the Bradford and Newbury Fair Grounds with the grandstand thereon, for the use as a Public Park, or any Civic or Community purpose. This offer, if accepted, to be subject to the approval of the Bradford Fair Association and the Bradford Grandstand Association.

5. If approval of the Fair Ground and Grandstand Association is received, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to put a new steel roof on the building.

6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 to cover the expenditure of damage done to roads by the flood rains of last April.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

8. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

10. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

11. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Town Planning Board of five or seven members, if the General Court has enacted enabling legislation.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

From the above table it may be noted:—

1. One or two days were lost in each school.
2. The overage membership for the district has increased about 8.
3. The percent of attendance has fallen considerably and is about 4% below the average for the state. Regular attendance is essential to regular progress in the work of pupils.
4. The number of tardinesses has increased about 76%. Parents should make every effort to teach punctuality. Getting to school on time is a practical way to do it.
5. Of the fifteen pupils who completed the work of the eighth grade last June, nearly two-thirds have gone to high schools in nearby towns.

Good progress was made in health work in the schools during the year. A dental clinic was held with the assistance of Dr. R. F. Oliver and Miss Wilson who was part-time school nurse for a few months. More work of this kind is needed. Health of school children is a matter of prime importance. Without this they can accomplish little. We would recommend the regular employment of a school nurse sharing her time with other districts and paying a proportionate part of her salary. The cost would probably be about \$125.00 per year.

Considerable interest in instruction in music in the schools has been manifested. A trained teacher who would give at least a half hour of instruction weekly in this subject in each school of the district could be hired for \$150.00. Music is a subject of instruction in practically all the schools of the state, and is taught in all the other districts in this supervisory union. The children of this district would receive much benefit from instruction in this subject which is becoming more and more a part of our daily life.

As in our report for 1932 we would continue to recommend the consideration of a new building for the village school. The cost of materials and labor is now comparatively low. Aid may be obtained from the Federal Government on very generous terms. The old building is poorly lighted, and ventilated. The playground is entirely inadequate to the needs of the school, and pupils playing there are exposed to the danger of traffic on the main road. The children of the district are worthy of a better school home.

In conclusion we thank the parents and other citizens of the district who have co-operated with the schools for the benefit of the pupils. The loyalty, support, and unflagging interest of all the teachers and members of the school board have made the progress of the schools certain, and work with them a pleasure.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same. The raising of money and other articles in the warrant to be taken up at 1 o'clock, P. M.

2A. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

3A. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,062.71 for the construction of the Center road, provided the State shall appro-

The results of the annual medical inspection showed that nine pupils with defective vision were reported of whom three had defects corrected. Fifteen pupils had defective teeth and 4 had defects corrected. Of three having diseased tonsils two had defects corrected.

At the March meeting a sum of money was raised to employ a school nurse during the year 1935-36. This is an important step in the right direction, and we are confident that the results of the work this year will amply justify the expenditure of the small sum involved. A partial report of the school nurse,

Mrs. Reuben S. Moore, R. N., shows that already many pupils have received the benefit of her work. A full report will be available at the end of the year.

Another improvement in the schools for 1935-36 is the introduction of regular instruction in music, by a special teacher, Mrs. C. B. Chase, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music. Mrs. Chase has had several years of successful experience in teaching public school music in Massachusetts.

During the winter of 1934-35 the district cooperated in furnishing use of the Grammar School room for classes in adult education under the provision of the F.E.R.A. Three different teachers were employed in part by the district and classes in Cooking, Art Appreciation, Furniture Repairing, First Aid, and Basketball were conducted.

The most pressing need of the district continues to be a new school building for the Village School.

We desire to thank the board, parents, and teachers for their cooperation and support during the year. It is only by working together that we shall be able to advance the interests of education, and place the affairs of the district in a satisfactory condition for future advancement.

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### **THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bradford in the  
County of Merrimack in said State, qualified  
to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town Hall  
in said Bradford on Tuesday, the Ninth day of  
March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to  
act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the  
year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be ne-  
cessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year  
and make appropriations of the same. The raising  
of money and other articles in the warrant to be ta-  
ken up at 1 o'clock P. M.
3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee.  
and act thereon.
4. To see if the Town will vote for State Aid Con-  
struction on the Center Road, or Class V assistance  
and raise and appropriate money for same as fol-

lows: If State Aid Construction is desired, it must be expended on the Center Road, and the State will contribute \$2,144.00 providing the Town will raise \$1,072.50, or if Class V assistance is desired, the Town must raise \$682.32 and the State will contribute \$2,729.27.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Sesqui-centennial celebration.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for a road grader.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to build tables and grill at French Park.

8. To see what action the Town will take in raising money for a new bridge on the Hubert Davis road.

9. To see if the Town will vote to install a new light on Frog street near the residence of Carroll Butman.

10. By a resolution adopted by the General Court, the Town is requested to vote on the following question. "Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?"

11. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen in conjunction with the highway department, to purchase or condemn according to law, the land and buildings on the northeast corner of Main and High streets, formerly known as the Dunstan

Garage, for the purpose of removing the buildings in the cause of highway safety and flood control.

12. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee to see what can be done about the purchase of Cemetery Hill, or take any other action necessary to obtain this end.

## **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

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To the School Board of Bradford District:

During the year 1935-36 the teachers employed in the district were as follows: Doris B. Williams, K. U. A. '22 at the Center school; Martha W. Cilley, K. N. S. S. S. at the Village Primary; L. Russell Heath, K. N. S. '33 at the Grammar school. Mrs. Helen Nye assisted in the Primary school during a part of the year. Mrs. Ruth B. Chase was music supervisor.

Although there was a slight increase in the per cent of attendance it is still below the average for the state, but that for the Grammar school is very good. The number of tardinesses has increased nearly one third. This increase was entirely in the village schools. The number at the Center is three less than the previous year.

The total number of pupils attending the schools of the district was 87 of whom 7 were non-resident. There were three high school pupils in the district attending school at Concord; five at Henniker, and twelve at Warner. The number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools was therefore 100.

The reports of the Medical examiner, Dr. R. F. Oliver, and the school nurse, Mrs. R. S. Moore, R. N.,

show that 84 pupils were examined during the year of whom six had defective vision, five impaired hearing, eleven defective teeth, and ten diseased tonsils. A dental clinic was held in June at which many of the pupils having defective teeth were treated.

At the school district meeting last March it seemed that a majority of the citizens favored at least an investigation of the possibility of building a new school house. Undoubtedly most of the people in the district realize the need of a new building and adequate playground. The question in the minds of many seemed to be whether the district could afford it, but should we not ask ourselves whether we can afford to go on with the old building. Can parents afford impairment of their children's eyesight, inadequate ventilation, lack of playground facilities and the danger from passing automobiles when pupils are playing ball on the present school grounds? To date we have had no accident, but the danger is ever present that some child in pursuit of a ball may run thoughtlessly into the path of a rapidly moving automobile.

It is impossible to alter satisfactorily the old building and annex an adequate piece of playground for less than the cost of a new building. We hope that every voter in the district will give careful consideration to both sides of the question before taking a decided position.

If a vote for a new building is not obtained there is need of considerable minor repairs both at the Village and the Center Schools. A few sets of textbooks and reference books are also needed.

In conclusion we wish to state our appreciation of the cooperation and support of the board, teachers, and parents in our endeavors to forward the educational interests of the district.

During the year 1936-'37 the teachers employed in the district were as follows:

The Center School, Miss Doris B. Williams, K. U. A. '22. The Village Primary, Miss Martha W. Cilley, K. N. S. S. S. The Grammar School, L. Russell Heath, K. N. S., '33. Mrs. Ruth Chase was music supervisor.

From the above table the following may be noted:

1. Each school had full 360 half-day sessions as required by law.
2. The number of pupils and average attendance remains about the same.
3. The percent of attendance at the Grammar School and the Center was excellent. That at the Primary School was lowered by illness of the pupils.
4. There was a marked decrease in the number of cases of tardiness. The amount of tardiness is still high. Every effort should be made to keep it at less than one per pupil.

The number of pupils registered in the schools of the district was 86. Of these four were tuition pupils from Newbury. Deducting these and adding 21 high school pupils who attend schools in other towns we have 103 pupils residing in the district and attending public schools. This is only three more than last year.

The annual report of the school nurse, Mrs. Ruth S. Moore, R. N., shows that all the pupils were examined for the usual defects. Nine were found with defective vision, and six with diseased tonsils. At a dental clinic held early in June 18 pupils received complete care and were awarded dental certificates. Dr. E. F. Keane did the work in dentistry assisted by the school nurse. The clinic was financed by the school health fund. We hope that this may be continued next year.

The erection of a modern 3-room school building during the summer fills a long felt need of the community. To appreciate the full extent of this improvement every citizen should first visit the old school rooms under the town hall and then the new building. To supplement this advancement a large well heated motor-bus is used to transport the pupils from the Center. In the physical equipment of its schools Bradford District now stands high among the progressive towns of the state.

In behalf of the pupils and teachers we wish to express our appreciation of the vote of parents and citizens to tax themselves for the purpose of providing a worthy school home for the pupils of the district.

vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall  
in said Bradford on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of  
March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to  
act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the  
year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be neces-  
sary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and  
make appropriations of the same. The raising of  
money and other articles in the warrant to be taken  
up at 1 o'clock P. M.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-  
propriate the sum of \$100.00 for forest fire equip-  
ment; the State to pay an equal sum if the money is  
appropriated.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and ap-  
propriate money for roads as follows: (A) whether

the Town will vote to accept Secondary Highway road whereby the State will furnish the sum of \$2,-280.00 provided the Town will raise the sum of \$1,-140.00; the money to be expended on the Center road, or (B) whether the Town will vote to accept T.R.A. aid whereby the State will furnish the sum of \$2,739.02 if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$684.76.

5. That the Selectmen be instructed to utilize the shed known as the Roller Shed at Bradford Center for Town purposes, or sell at public auction to the highest bidder before July 15, 1939.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to construct a cell under the fire station for police purposes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for sidewalk construction.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Pine Blister Rust control.

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## **BE A GOOD CITIZEN**

### **HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES**

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The hurricane of September, 1938, left behind it, some very serious fire problems. If we are to be successful in keeping the number of local fires to a minimum and if we are to prevent serious losses from fires that do occur, the cooperation of every citizen in this town is essential.

Local citizens can contribute materially by complying with the following suggestions:

1. Do not burn brush or any other debris once the snow has left the ground without first securing a permit from the forest fire warden. The forest laws of the State of New Hampshire require this.
2. Do not drop or throw from any vehicle any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, live ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.
3. Notify the warden promptly of any fires you see.

Please read carefully the following excerpts from the provisions of the forest laws of the State:

Paragraph 34, Section B:—No person shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or shall burn or cause

to be burned any material in or near woodland, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut-over land or where the fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written permit from the forest fire warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

**Section 35:—**Any person by himself or agent, kindling or causing to be kindled, any fire without permission of the forest fire warden when such permit is required . . . . . and also any person by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents, any fire shall be caused, shall be liable in a civil action for the payment to the town of the expenses incurred by the forest fire warden or deputy warden in attending or extinguishing such fires.

**Section 35A:—**No person shall drop or throw from any vehicle while the same is upon a public highway . . . . . or drop, throw, or otherwise deposit on or near woodlands as just defined, except as permitted by law, any lighted match, cigar, cigarette, five ashes or any other substance liable to cause a fire.

**PENALTIES:—**Whoever causes or kindles a fire by any means, wilfully or in a careless manner, which shall endanger woodland as described in 34B, shall be fined not more than \$500.00 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

Whoever is found guilty of violating a provision of Section 35A shall be fined not more than \$25.00.

**DAMAGES: Section 38—**Any person who shall set fire on any land that shall run upon the land of any other person, shall pay to the owner, all damages done by such fire.

The cooperation of every citizen of this town is earnestly solicited. You can assist materially by complying with the requirements of the forest laws; by burning whatever brush or debris you may desire, before the snow leaves the ground and quickly calling attention of the fire warden or his deputy to the existence of any forest fire you may discover.

Your cooperation will lighten the burden of the warden and his deputies and assist materially in preventing and keeping our fire losses to a minimum.

On account of many cases of measles, mumps, and whooping cough among the pupils of the schools of the district the percent of attendance fell very low in 1937-'38. This year we hope there maybe a great improvement in this respect. There was also an increase in tardiness with an average of more than one per pupil. In the primary room there were more than two per pupil.

The average membership was nearly nine more than during the previous year. The number of pupils registered in the schools of the district was 92. Of these three were tuition pupils. Twenty pupils attended high school in other districts. The total number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools was therefore 109.

The annual report of the school nurse, Miss Ruth B. Whitcomb, shows that a dental clinic was held three days at the school and 32 pupils were treated by Dr. Cummings of Warner. This was financed by the school health fund. A vision clinic was held at the school in January and 73 pupils were examined by Dr. Mansfield of Newport. Two children were previously taken to Concord for glasses in November, '37. A tonsil clinic was held at the N. H. Memorial Hospital in July '38 and two pupils received treatment by Dr. Amsden of Concord. Considerable time was also spent on two welfare cases. Sixty-eight



cases of measles were reported during the year. All pupils were tested for acuteness of hearing by means of the audiometer. Only three pupils were found with hearing loss.

From this report it will be seen that a great deal was done to improve the health of the pupils and put them into condition for doing better work in school. With the epidemic of measles over, and the amount of preventative work done this year, we look forward to a much improved attendance record in 1938-'39.

The health of pupils may be further safeguarded by warm lunches at school. Plenty of room with tables and seats for this purpose is provided in the new school building. A new electric range has been installed for the school by the Chas. H. Ballard Co., without charge. A generous supply of cooking utensils for school use has been donated to the school by Mr. F. H. Felton. In behalf of the pupils and teachers we wish to thank these gentlemen for their interest in the improvement of the school and their generous practical support. We hope that we shall be able to show them as a result of their gifts a general improvement in the health of the pupils and an increase in average attendance.
